# Mariachi Vargas brings century of tradition to Valley fans

Not many groups have the staying power and tradition of El Mejor Mariachi Del Mundo, Mariachi Vargas de Tecalitlán. The group is now in its 108th year, performing with a fifth generation of musicians who continue to bring huapangos, românticos and rancheras to audiences worldwide.

Currently, the group is comprised of six violinists, two trumpeters and one player each for the vihuela, harp, guitar and guitarron. It has been under the direction of Maestro Rubén Fuentes for 60 years and Jose "Pepe" Martínez, the group's musical director and arranger, since 1975

recording songs based on Mexican folklore, such as its recent adaptation of Italian opera tenor Andrea Bocelli's "Por Ti Volare" ("I'll fly for You"), but the song is world renowned and was translated into Spanish.

That song and others it has adapted from Spain and interpreted into mariachi styles have enabled it to continue to be world renowned, Martinez said.

Mariachi Vargas has a crossgenerational appeal. At the group's concerts it's normal to see a great-grandmother, grandmother, mother and child seated together, he said.

It hasn't hurt that the group recently accompanied Luis Miguel on his latest CD, Mexico en la Piel.

Aside from the enduring influence of Fuentes, who became a member of the group in his 20s, what helps it maintain the mariachi tradition and allows it to still appeal to younger audiences is the wide age range of its members.

Frederico Torres, the group's trumpet player and coordinator is 67, and Martinez is 65. The youngest members of the group are violinists Steven Sandoval and Alberto Alfaró, both 30, Martinez said.

The group has been busy recently; it has toured Mexico extensively and performed in

concerts with the symphonies of the cities which it visited.

Known to record two to three CDs a year, and with more than 60 to their credit, the group recently released two new ones, Las Cancionés de José Alfredo Jiménez, Los Arreglos de Rubén Fuentes and Por ti Cantaré y Volaré.

Currently, the group is working on two other CDs, which have yet to be named. One of the albums will feature more adaptations of José Alfredo Jiménez's and the Hermanos Castro's work, and the other will be a symphonic-based compilation.

Special guest performances at the concert include Gerardo Lopez and Vanessa del Fierro, finalists from the national television competition Nuevas Voces de América. The University of Texas Pan-American's Mariachi Femenil, Roma High School's Mariachi Nuevo Santander, Zapata High School's Mariachi Halcon, Edinburg High School's Primer Orgullo Mariachi, La Joya High School's Mariachi Los Coyotes and the Dancentre of Edinburg are also scheduled to perform.
